Confessions of a "New" Genealogy Addict

It all started when I bought a beautiful genealogy chart that would record eight generations. It's about 20" by 30," in the shape of a woman's fan, and in beautiful shades of cream and beige. I do calligraphy and I thought if I could only find a decent amount of information to fill out the chart enough to look "pretty," I'd be happy. I also did it for my three children, because I knew no one else in my family would ever have the "gumption" to tackle a project like this. Besides, in the back of my mind, I always knew someday I wanted to do it.

So the genealogy chart is what it took for me to start. What can I say? It did not, however, take long before I was hopelessly addicted. It's funny, but when I began, I started with one little folder labeled "Genealogy Stuff." I now have two file boxes and several notebooks full of "stuff!" My three teenage sons would just roll their eyes at me like I was crazy when I was working on it. They would crack little jokes about how "geeky" I was being. They don't "get it" yet. They're teenagers! Of course I tell them all the time, "Someday you will thank me for this!"

I was fortunate enough to have a family that saved many old documents and photos. I knew many papers and pictures existed, so when I began the genealogy work, I called all my relatives and told them what I wanted to do and what I needed. The response from my family was great, they mailed me so many things, and gave me a terrific starting point. They were all very excited about what I was going to attempt to do and over the next few weeks, it was like "Christmas" every time I got my mail. I began "gathering" information. It did not take long at all to become obsessed with "the search". As many of you out there know, each new piece of information that is unearthed is like a gift and then allows you to take the search one step farther.

My beautiful maternal grandmother, Kathryn Alleen Jewett Ratliff and her sister, Mary Jane Jewett cutler were the last to carry the Jewett surname in my family, as my great-grandparents, Russell Cory Jewett and Leonore Isabel Curtis had just the two daughters. So my "Jewett" search began with Russell.

I must confess, before I go any further, that I probably would have given up very quickly had it not been for the internet. I did however realize that one cannot take everything they find on the internet for "gospel." You must always try to verify, verify. Between writing to many town clerks, endless phone calls, searching cemetery sites, the internet, etc., I found a very respectable amount of information on many different lines of my ancestors.

While working on the "Jewett" side, I kept noticing "The History and Genealogy of the Jewetts in America" being used as a reference whenever I found a person I knew was one of my "Jewetts." Nobody currently alive in my family ever knew about these books, so that information was never passed down or had not known for some time. Because I did not yet know about the "Jewett Family of America," I tracked down the books, all four volumes, from a rare book dealer in Connecticut, and ordered them. I was astounded and my excitement was beyond words when I received them. To have something like this about your family was amazing. I thought these books would immediately answer all my questions. But, they didn't. Somewhere along the way, one or two hundred years ago, that part of my family lost touch and therefore did not participate in the

questionnaires, etc. to contribute to the books.

I was, at one point VERY frustratingly stuck for several months at "my" Jonathan Jewett (10,632) born in 1765. Jonathan would have been the eighth generation in my "chart," THE chart, and I should have been content with that, but I couldn't stop with him. I couldn't "let it go." Then to my complete surprise, I quite literally stumbled upon the Jewett Forum. I decided to post an inquiry, and later that same day, the amazing Jim Jewett from Spokane, Washington answered all my questions! He made my "connections" from Jonathan Jewett back to Edward Jowett. Jim was awesome in helping me and sent me so many great files, files of all his own hard work and searching. I thank Jim from the bottom of my heart for his help.

Now I am getting to the real point of this article. I could not believe the thorough and rich history of the Jewetts. I am still really only a "beginner" at this. I know there are a great many people out there who have been at this for decades. It was my good fortune to be able to benefit so wholly at times from the endless work of so many others before me, who gathered and organized all the information about our ancestors in order to preserve and perpetuate our past. How many families have such complete, details, and wonderful books on their history? I treasure my Jewett Books. I an now a member of "JFA" and look forward to new newsletters. I am thankful beyond words for everybody else's hard work. This not only goes for my Jewett side, but my Ratliff, Spencer, Cummings, Cory, and Adams' lines also. Thank goodness for all the people out there who share their work, either by books, the internet, and all other means. My fairly successful genealogy presentation to my family at a recent reunion was really only possible because of the work of so many others. I thank you and commend you all!

P.S. Just a little side note: I found that one of my Cummings ancestors, Elizabeth Cummings, daughter of Isaac Cummings of Topsfield, Massachusetts, married John Jewett in Rowley, Massachusetts in 1661. How cool is than!?!

Biographical Sketch of James E. Jewett (10,139)

Text from Haynes, Nathaniel S. *History of the Disciples of Christ in Illinois 1819-1914*, Cincinnati: Standard Publishing company, 1915 pages 543-544.

Born: Belfast, ME., 1844

Died: Lincoln, Logan Co., Illinois, 1912.

Came with his parents to Illinois in 1856, who settled on the wild prairie in Livingston County four miles northeast of Gridley. His education was received in the public schools of that time. Mr. Jewett came of fine, patriotic stock. One of his grandfathers, John Cochran, was a member of the "Boston Tea Party", a soldier in the Revolution and an inmate of a British prison for nine months. His paternal grandfather was a soldier in the War of 1812. He himself enlisted Aug. 7, 1862, as a

private in Company G, 129th Illinois Infantry, in which he served with superior courage and distinction till the close of the war. He followed the flag through all that high carnival for blood and death that led to Atlanta, to the sea and to the "Grand Review" at Washington D.C.

Returning home, he went to the farm, next to the schoolroom as a teacher, and then to the ministry of the gospel. He also read law and was admitted to the bar, but only little of his time was given to the practice of this profession. He was also prominent in some the fraternal societies of the State, and filled a number of minor civil offices with recognized ability and credit.

His mind was always alert and his life full of action. His disposition was genial and kindly and his companionship pure and helpful. He sought and saw the best in human life and was serene in adversity.


