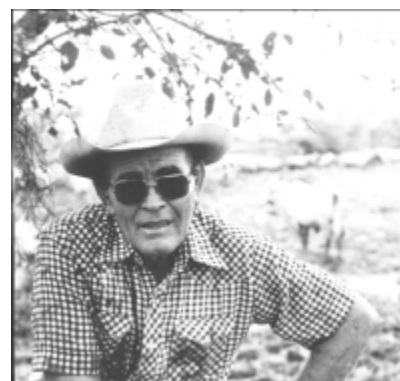

Information on the lives of William Cyrus Jewett and Jewett J. Wilcox has been collected from various historical records, and is presented in the following pages. William Jewett was a riverboat captain on the Missouri River in the 1840's and 1850's. Jewett Wilcox began work as a riverboat captain and then became a hotel manager of some renown in the Midwest.

Captain William Cyrus Jewett

William C. Jewett owned and operated riverboats on the lower Missouri River, operating from St. Louis up into Kansas. Captain Jewett operated several boats on the Missouri between 1842 and 1855. He is purported to have owned at least 3 steamboats. The first boat was named the **Lewis F. Linn**, named for an early United States Senator, and plied the Missouri River from 1842 – 1849. The boat was a side wheel craft, which eventually sunk at Penn's Bend, above St. Charles, Missouri in 1849. The second boat was the **Rowena**. The Rowena was listed as two hundred and thirty tons. The Rowena was in operation from 1847 – 1850, when it was sunk at the same place at Penn's Bend, above St. Charles on March 14, 1850. Captain Jewett then built the **Martha Jewett**, which was named for his sister. This boat was in operation from 1852 – 1855, and was referred to by one source as one of the finest and most popular boats on the river in her day, and was noted for having made the trip from St. Louis to Lexington in record time. The Martha Jewett was the boat which transported Wilson Shannon, the second territorial governor of Kansas, landing at Westport Landing, Kansas on August 31, 1855. In addition to the above boats, he is listed as being the captain of the steamboat **Kansas** in the 1850 Federal Census, while residing in the 4th ward of St. Louis Missouri. Max Zorer, an esteemed friend of Captain Jewett built a side wheeled boat in 1852, dedicating it the **Martha Jewett Polka**, in honor of his friend. An image of the boat is shown below.



One description of Captain Jewett stated that he was the most popular steamboat commander ever on the Missouri River. He was a dapper little fellow, exceedingly handsome, always dressed in the height of fashion. He was a universal favorite among the shippers, and, being a bachelor and a great gallant, was especially popular with the ladies. His cabin was always full of passengers and the deck of his boat loaded to the guards with freight.

A letter from Phil. E. Chappell from August 27, 1906 in his remembrances of riverboat traffic on the Missouri River stated:

“There was never but one Jewett on the river. His name was Wm. C. Jewett and he built and ran as commander, the Lewis F. Linn, Rowena, and Martha Jewett (named for his sister). This was in the ‘50’s, and, although I was but a lad, I remember him as well as if it was yesterday. He was a small, dapper little fellow, exceedingly polite and affable, and was a general favorite with the traveling public and the shippers. He was about thirty years old when I first knew him, dressed always in the height of fashion, and, being a bachelor, was an especial favorite with the young ladies of Boonville, Glasgow, Lexington and other lower river towns. I have known people to wait two weeks for Captain Jewett’s boat in going to St. Louis, and I have known him to hold his boat at a landing for an hour waiting for an old farmer to haul in his last hogshead of tobacco, which had been delayed on the road. Is it any wonder that he was the most popular captain that ever ran the river? Captain Jewett died at the age of about forty five, at the Planter’s House in St. Louis, with the cholera. This was in 1849 or 1850. He was from one of the New England states. He left a nephew, Jewett Wilcox, who became a noted hotel man in Chicago in the ‘60’s, but no immediate descendants.”

A direct connect has not yet been established, but in Paul Blaisdell’s “Three Centuries on Winnepesaukee” (a major lake in New Hampshire) the first steamboat captain on the lake was James Jewett, commanding the steamboat Belknap, which began regular passenger service on July 9, 1834. William C. Jewett’s father is James Jewett, who lived for some time in Middlebury, Vermont. It would be interesting to think that William Jewett learned about the steamboat trade from his father, but for the moment, Captain Jewett of the Belknap remains unidentified. Anyone with information concerning him is asked to send it in for publishing in the newsletter.



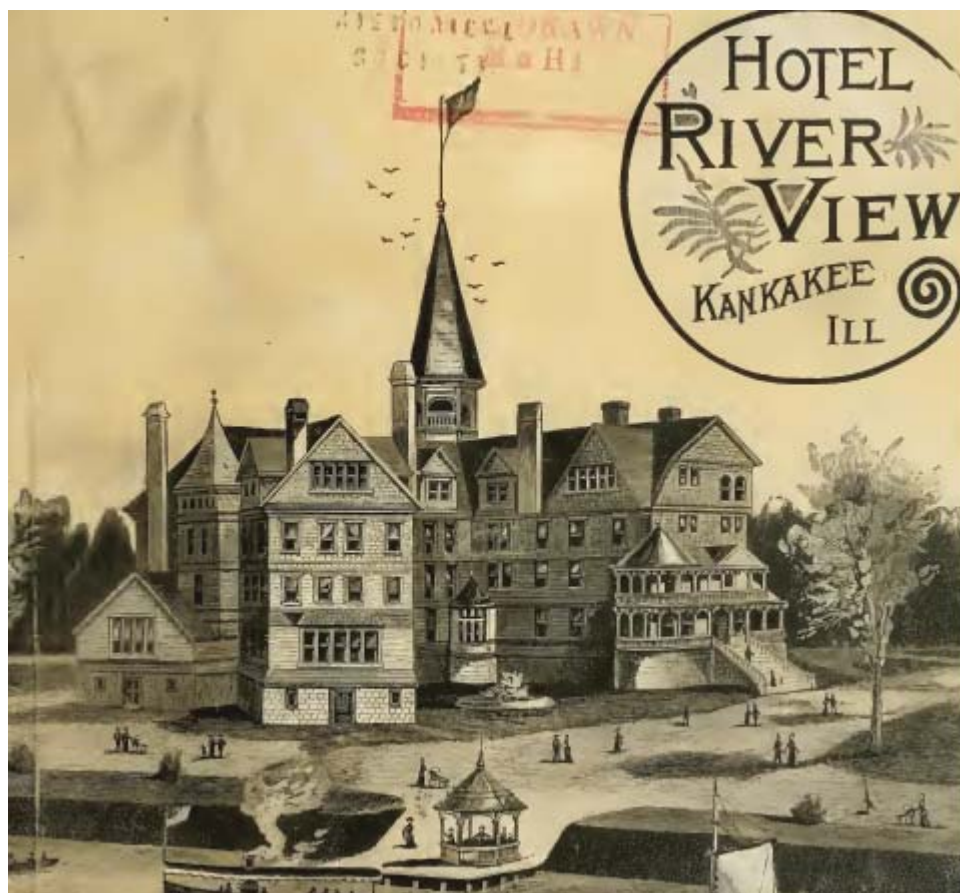

Steamboat Captain and Hotelier

Jewett Wilcox was born in Connecticut in 1830, and in his early 20’s he ventured west, most likely with his uncle William C. Jewett. By 1854 he was employed on the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers as a captain of freight and passenger boats. In 1859 Jewett was the ship’s clerk for the steamboat Omaha when he purchased ¼ share in the boat from the ship’s captain, Andrew Wineland. The 1860 Federal Census shows Jewett living in St. Louis, Missouri, with his wife Sara, and infant son William, and working as a clerk. The experience he obtained on the rivers were put to use during the Civil War, when he was put in charge of a dispatch boat. He remained in active duty until given an honorable discharge in 1864. After his discharge Jewett was engaged

in various business activities in Cairo, Illinois, until 1876, when he moved to Chicago. In 1870 he was operating a hotel in Cairo, Illinois, with a value of \$40,000 and a staff of 19 employees. In Chicago, Jewett first worked as manager of the Tremont House in Chicago. Other hotels managed by Jewett were the Gardner House (later renamed the Leland) in Chicago, The Hotel Lafayette in Lake Minnetonka, Minnesota (of which he took command in May 1884), the Greylock Hotel in Williamstown, Massachusetts, and from 1890 – 1897 he was the superintendent of the eating house system for the Illinois Central Railroad, and the Hotel Riverview in Kankakee, Illinois. In addition to managing several noted properties, Jewett was a member of the Hotel Men's Benefit Association. He was elected president of the body in May 1887. In 1895 he was elected to the board of directors for the body. Jewett was not all work, as he is noted to have taken at least one vacation back to Connecticut, where he actually received recognition in the Bulliten of the United States Fish Commission when he landed a 65 pound cod only 3 miles from Eastern Point light, Gloucester Harbor.

The obituary notice in the Chicago Tribune indicated that Jewett died on December 11, 1897 at the Chicago Beach Hotel. In addition to his wife he was survived by son William J. Wilcox, and daughter Maude Josephine. The funeral was held at on December 16, 1897 at the Chicago Beach Hotel, with burial in Vermont.
