



Jewett of America Cook Book Proposal

My beloved mother, Jeanne Jewett Mobley, descended from the Maximilian Jewett line spent her life researching our families' genealogy until her death in 1993. When my sister Kathy sadly passed away in 2012, I learned that she had kept 40 boxes of our mother's genealogy research in storage. It wasn't until I started to delve into the boxes that I first learned that I was part of such a historic family who, among other things, co-founded Rowley, Massachusetts.

As a child I grew up in Omaha, Nebraska and endured five full months of winter each year. Nebraska is flat; the winds come across the flat lands and freeze a person's fingers and toes like popsicles. As children all we had to do during those freezing, cold snowy days was bake, bowl or ice skate. We baked many tried and true family recipes like Christmas cake, peanut butter-chocolate sandwich cookies and peaches & cream pie.

Every family has special recipes that have been passed down from generation to generation. Preserving recipes and history with a family cookbook creates a lasting keepsake and renews a sense of unity within families who reside all over the country.

The idea to publish a Jewett's of America cookbook came to me one cool crisp Christmas night last year while I was making my Grandma Jewett's 24-hour fudge with my daughters Emma and Tessa. The fudge is so wonderful that the local Council Bluff newspaper ran an article in the 1940's. It occurred to me that this was one of the only recipes I had from the Jewett side of our family and I wished that I had more recipes. I wondered what other family recipes my ancestors had cooked and baked for the last 375 years.

When I sent an email off to Greg and asked him what he thought about the idea of publishing **The Jewett's of America Cookbook** he asked me to write this letter to all of you to open the discussion. What do you all think? Should we publish our own cookbook?

Youngsters Hate Waiting For This 24-Hour Fudge

The fudge that's not so popular with youngsters really makes a big hit with mothers. Strange as it seems, that's the case with a recipe recommended by Leona Martha Jewett (wife of Edward Thomas Jewett, #8872). "It's not that youngsters don't like the candy – it's just that you let the fudge stand as long as 24 hours before beating it," Mrs. Jewett explained. "This makes it nice for the housewife who can make her candy early in the morning or late at night – then beat it the next day," she said. But the small fry set up long objections to the long waiting period between cooking and eating.

Mrs. Jewett has used her "never fail" recipe for 15 years (she made 25 pounds last Christmas) and it has only "sugared" once. "If you allow the candy to get too stiff or hard, put it in a tin can or canister and it will soon soften up," she said. "The only thing different about this recipe is the way you combine the ingredients."

The recipe:

2 squares unsweetened chocolate
4 Tblsp butter
1 ½ Cups milk
3 cups sugar
½ cup nuts, chopped
1 tsp vanilla

Melt together two squares of unsweetened chocolate and 1/8 pound of butter. Add 1 ½ cups of milk and 3 cups of sugar; alternately, keeping the boiling constantly adds the milk in a consistently. Mrs. Jewett said she makes about three portions each. Let the candy boil up well in between each addition.

When the candy reaches the soft ball stage, remove from the fire and forget about it for about 24 hours. Then beat until creamy, add ½ cup nuts and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour out and cut when solidified.

Additional Recipes

(editor's picks)

Kay Jewett's Spiced Pecans

1 pound pecans
2 eggs whites (foamy)
½ to 2/3 cup brown sugar
1 ½ tsp cinnamon

Coat the pecans with the foamy, beaten egg whites. Stir in the sugar and spices. Spread in a single layer on a cookie sheet. Bake in a 275°F oven for 1 hour, stirring occasionally.

Marie Jewett's Snowball Cookies

½ cup butter
2 Tblsp sugar
1 cup flour
1 cup pecans
1 tsp vanilla

Cream the butter, sugar and vanilla. Slowly add in the flour and process until smooth. Stir in the nuts. Chill for several hours or overnight. Pinch off enough chilled dough to roll into a 1 inch ball. Bake at 300°F for 30-40 minutes on a greased cookie sheet. Roll inn powdered sugar while still warm and let cool on a wire rack.

William Kennon Jewett

JFA #5,312

William was born on January 1, 1857 to Hugh Judge (JFA #2,963) and Sarah Elisabeth (Guthrie) Jewett in Putnam, Ohio. His father Hugh was a distinguished lawyer, banker and railroad executive. It was Hugh Jewett who rehabilitated the Erie Railroad. His character was such that in 1880 he as strongly considered for the Democratic presidential candidate.

William lived with his parents in the Zanesville, Ohio until the family moved to Columbus, Ohio in 1869. He spent most of his youth in the Zanesville and Columbus public schools, but eventually was sent to a private boarding school in Painesville, Ohio. In 1874 the family moved to New York City, when his father accepted the position of president of the Erie Railroad. William then attended a boarding school in Williamstown, MA. After finishing his studies, William then attended Williams College in Williamstown, MA graduating in 1879. He then spent a few months abroad before entering the world of business.



In 1879 William took a position with the Erie Railroad. From there, William took a position with Charles Pratt and Company in New York City, NY, an oil company that was by then part of J. D. Rockefeller's Standard Oil Trust. While working for the Charles Pratt Company; William met and eventually married Patty Kyle Stuart, on October 6, 1881 in Philadelphia, PA. Patty was the daughter of George Hay Stuart and Martha Kyle Dennison, born 26 August 1858. In 1882, William went to work with Pintsch Lighting Company of New York, where he remained until 1886. In 1886 he became the treasurer of Windsor Locks Steel Co, in Bridgeport, CN, where he continued until 1893.

In 1893 William and Patty moved to Colorado Springs, Colorado due to William's health. While living in Colorado Springs William remained active in the business community. He became the president of the London Mining and Reduction (later Milling) Company, situated near Fairplay, CO, which operated as a gold, silver and lead mine, incorporated in 1912. Interestingly, William's father Hugh was originally involved in a mining venture named London in the vicinity of Fairplay, CO which was established in 1882. That company eventually failed due to the mining collapse. William was also the director of the Colorado Springs Trust, Company, and in February 1907 William and several others incorporated the Colorado Springs National Bank with a capitalization of \$100,000, where he served as vice president. While William worked Patty kept busy doing charity work and was a social leader in the community



While living in Colorado Springs William and Patty constructed a house between 1905 and 1906. Their home was designed in the Italian Renaissance style by Gove & Walsh of Denver, who were also responsible for Denver's Union Station. Like many of the wealthy in the west, the Jewetts began spending winters in Pasadena, CA. In 1913 they moved there full time, due to Patty's declining health. They loved their Colorado Springs house so much that they built a near-facsimile of their Colorado Springs home. Today the house in Colorado Springs is operated as the Parish House by the First Lutheran Church which is used daily by 34 different 12-step support groups, by First Lutheran's Christian Education ministry, by community groups, and for receptions, programs, and (now!) concerts.

Although William and Patty relocated to Pasadena they continued to make return visits to Colorado Springs. While in Pasadena Patty developed an interest in collecting Native American art. Patty may have acquired her interest in Indians through her father, George Stuart, a Philadelphia businessman and social reformer involved, among other causes, with abolition and Indian rights. Over the years Patty Jewett had acquired Navajo blankets, Plains beadwork, but most of all baskets. The collection totaled 238 specimens, valued in 1918 at \$12,000. Of more than 150 baskets, nearly two-thirds are Californian. Fifty of the total are Pomo baskets, a high percentage of which are the expensive, solidly feathered kind. There are also a number of small, finely woven miniatures. Patty Jewett died 2 May 1917 in Pasadena, CA. After her death her art collection remained with William in Pasadena until he was persuaded in 1919 to donate the collection Penn University Museum in Philadelphia, PA.

William remarried on January 3, 1918 to Elisabeth Sprague Stuart, daughter of George Hay Stuart Jr. and Hannah Brown Sprague Tobey. At that point, William was essentially retired and the couple continued to live in Pasadena, CA. William was appointed a Fellow in perpetuity of Metropolitan Museum of Art, of New York and William maintained memberships in various golf clubs: University (NY), Denver, El Paso, Cheyenne Mountain Country, Colorado Springs Golf (Colorado Springs) and Annandale County (Pasadena CA). William died 27 August 1935 at Montecito, CA.



Arden Villa – The Pasadena Residence

William had the Palladian villa (Arden Villa) designed by Pasadena architects Sylvanus Marston and Garrett Van Pelt. Acting as his own contractor in 1915, Jewett built the house as a winter retreat. The home of many famous and infamous characters, both fictional and real, it is a two story seventeen room residence built at the then extravagant cost of \$50,000. Cloistered behind a gated entry and at the end of a tree-lined 100 yard driveway, the house was originally situated on a nine acre parcel of land stretching from Rosalind Road to Lombardy Road. Six full time gardeners were employed to maintain the grounds and its celebrated seven gardens. Although prominent in early Pasadena society, William and his second wife, Elise Stewart of Philadelphia, entertained in a more decorous manner, hosting musical evenings in the "garage" which housed a large ballroom and five two-room chauffeur's apartments. Elisabeth continued living in the house until 1945.

The garage was demolished in 1948 by a subsequent owner. The property was also subdivided leaving only the original house and a modernized four car garage on the current two and a half acre parcel. In 1957, the house was sold and the new owners added the tennis court and swimming pool. The estate has been featured in the Marx Brothers movie "Duck Soup," and many other features, including "Terms of Endearment," and "Gods and Monsters", as well as a host of television programs including "Knots Landing," "Knight Rider," "Hart to Hart," "The A-Team," "Matlock," "Remington Steele," and "CSI: Miami." However, the house is best known for its use in the TV drama "Dynasty". Arden Villa was the home of the fictional family the Carringtons, starring Linda Evans and Joan Collins and John Forsythe.

Patty Jewett Golf Course

William and Patty loved outdoor sports, especially golf and shortly after the opening of a private club, "The Town and Gown Club," William joined. The course was one of the earliest courses built west of the Mississippi, designed by Willie Campbell, opening in 1898. The club eventually fell on hard times and went bankrupt. The club was purchased by a group of men including William Jewett, who was a good friend of Colorado Springs founder, Gen. William Jackson Palmer, and he helped organize and finance the new Colorado Springs Golf Club in 1910. Following the establishment of the new club in 1910, a clubhouse and banquet room were built.



William eventually bought out all of the other partners and by the late 1910s. Following the death of Patty in 1917, William decided to create a memorial to his wife by donating the golf course to the city of Colorado Springs. Thus on June 14, 1919 The grounds were donated to the city, with two stipulations; 1) that the course be named after his wife (Patty) and that 2) the grounds must never be anything but a golf course or park."

The, Patty Jewett has a historical background predating all but two of the thousands of golf clubs scattered over the country, and holds the distinction of being the third oldest public golf club west of the Mississippi River. The course and restaurant terrace

Lodging Information for the Reunion

The following list of accommodations is provided to enable family members attending from out of the area a variety of locations at which to find someplace to stay while attending the family reunion. It should be noted that the town of Rowley is rather small, and does not have a hotel from a major chain, only local motels and Bed and Breakfasts. The surrounding villages also lack major hotel chains. The closest location of major hotels is in the north Boston suburbs and Newbury Port, MA. Please be warned that the first weekend in August is still high tourist season for the area, so hotel prices may be higher than expected, and may also be booked fairly early. The following list is by no means a complete summary of all the lodgings, nor meant to provide any statement on the quality of the establishments. Also note that rooms may still be available at the Country Garden Inn and Spa in Rowley, as described in the last newsletter, **phone reservations only**.


