Contemplations of your President

Claire and I just returned from ten days at our house at mid-coast Maine and it was probably the most delightful we have spent there in several years. The days were bright and sunny in the 70's and the nights were mostly in the fifties and there was a beautiful sea breeze most days. When we were up in July, we had some of the hottest weather I can remember when the temperature was in the 90's during the day and 70's at night, humid and very little if any sea breeze. We have a ceiling fan in the living room which helps but the bedrooms are hot and oppressive even with a small tower fan. I decided then and there that I would install a small widow air conditioner in the bedroom to make sleeping more comfortable in the future and did so upon our arrival in early August. So, of course, the weather was beautiful and I barely turned the unit on except for testing. Now maybe if I buy a new snow blower and snowmobile I can prevent it from snowing next winter – yeah, right!

During our vacation we visited all our local favorite restaurants and discovered a new one on US Route 1 just south of Wiscasset center. They have a special “Digger’s Lobster Roll” which blows away the ones I normally get at Red’s Eats. Not only is it served in a footlong toasted roll but it has at least 16 ounces of fresh, pure, unadulterated lobster meat including big pieces of body meat, whole tails and claws. Not only that, but there is seldom a line so you get your meal quickly. At \$25.00 it is more expensive than the ones served at Red’s Eats but you get at least twice the amount of lobster. I understand their fried clams, scallops, hot dogs and hamburgers are good too.



I don't know if any of you have visited mid-coast Maine during tourist season but US Route 1 is notorious for backing up north and south of Wiscasset most days from about 11:00 AM onward. It is not unusual to have a 5 or 6 mile backup south of “the Prettiest Little Village in Maine” which is what Wiscasset calls itself on the sign entering the town. It has actually been superseded state wide by Camden and Thomaston but that doesn't stop the city fathers from assigning the title. For years, traffic has slowed down as it passes through this area resulting in the backups and the congestion has been studied 6 ways from Sunday. Recently, the Maine DOT spent many millions of dollars planning various bypass routes which were universally loved and/or hated by the residents for various self serving reasons, and finally decided on one route which supposedly had the least negative impact and decided to proceed. But guess what? Almost immediately they discovered a Bald Eagles nest directly in the path which killed the whole project. Countless years of studies and Wiscasset remains the Pretties Little Village with a huge traffic problem.

I hope you were able to attend “Jewett Day” on August 3rd at the Jewett house at Oberlin Heritage Center. JFA Director Greg Jewett was instrumental in making this event happen and I'm sure it went well.

1. CHARLES COFFIN⁷ JEWETT (*PAUL⁶, PAUL⁵, JOSHUA⁴, JOSEPH³, JOSEPH², EDWARD¹ JOWETT*) was born 12 Aug 1816 in Lebanon, York, Maine, and died 09 Jan 1868 in Braintree, Norfolk, Massachusetts. He married REBECCA GREEN HASKINS 05 Apr 1848, daughter of RALPH HASKINS and REBECCA GREEN. She was born 20 Sep 1823 in Brookline, Norfolk, Massachusetts, and died 03 Jan 1884 in Boston, Suffolk, Massachusetts.

Notes for CHARLES COFFIN JEWETT:

Prof. Jewett was a graduate of Brown University in 1835. His intentions on leaving college was to prepare himself for the Christian ministry, but having a decided taste for oriental research, he formed comprehensive plans for extensive travels with a view to the thorough study of Asiatic literature and religion, but especially those of Palestine. He was unexpectedly delayed in the accomplishment of this plan by the misdirection of a letter, and that apparently slight circumstance determined his subsequent course, and gave complexion to all his after life. While pursuing his theological course at Andover, his taste for bibliographical studies pointed him out as the proper person to arrange the library of the Theological Seminary in that place. He assisted Mr. O. A. Taylor in preparing a catalogue of the library. It was of a highly valuable character, and the success of that effort led to his appointment as the librarian of Brown University. Large additions to that library were soon made, and Mr. Jewett went to Europe and was absent two years and a half, not only to select books for the library, but to study French, German and Italian languages and the bibliographical plans for arranging and cataloguing libraries, which had been carried to the greatest perfection in France and Germany, where the subject has long been made a matter of profound scientific investigation. On his return, he prepared for the press a catalogue of the library of Brown University which was published in 1843, and it was so original and intrinsically valuable, that it at once placed him at the head of the bibliographers of this country. He held the position of the college librarian from 1841 to 1848, and for the most of that period he was also Professor of Modern Languages and Literature. When the munificent donation of Mr. James Smithson of England was received in this country, it was at first determined to appropriate it to the creation of a public library at Washington, which should be worthy of the United States, and Mr. Jewett was appointed the librarian of that Institution. The regents of the Smithsonian fund, however, afterwards gave it another direction, but Mr. Jewett had the charge of the library long enough to establish a correspondence with all the leading libraries in the United States, and to collect much valuable information upon the subject. At his instance, a convention of the librarians was called, from different parts of the country, for the purpose of devising the best method of accomplishing the difficult task of forming, arranging, and cataloguing large public libraries. Mr. Jewett's release from his duties as librarian of the Smithsonian Institution, in consequence of the change in the policy pursued, was synchronous with the formation of the public library of Boston. The large donation of Mr. Bates of London, for the creation of that library, made it necessary to employ the best bibliographical skill to select and arrange it for the public use. Mr. Jewett was chosen for that important post, and he entered with great zeal upon the duties of the office. Upon the completion of the library building in 1858, he was appointed Superintendent of that institution by the City Council, on the unanimous recommendation of the trustees. Mr. Jewett prepared and published two large volumes, containing catalogues of books in both the upper and lower halls of that library, which will long remain remarkable monuments of his industry, scholarship, and executive ability. Every one, at all acquainted with the subject, knows the extreme difficulty of forming a catalogue of a large library, to which constant additions are being made, and keeping that catalogue full and complete, without frequently publishing supplements. Supplements are always inconvenient, they soon become numerous, and thus the business of finding any particular book becomes more and more complicated and difficult. The best bibliographers in Europe have long since pronounced it an impossibility to form a catalogue of a large library to which constant additions are made, and which shall be continuous, and thus supersede the necessity of supplements. This problem Mr. Jewett solved, and it is, perhaps, the greatest triumph in modern bibliography. The possibility and practicability of making a continuous catalogue, which shall embrace all additions, arranged in their proper places, have been demonstrated by the plan which he practically inaugurated in the public library of this city (Boston), and which has already been adopted by several of the large libraries in the United States. ...

"Mr. Jewett was also a devoted Christian. For several years he was senior warden of Christ Church in Quincy. His pastor says: 'All his learning, wisdom and strength were devoted to his loved Saviour. He was a firm believer in the divinity of our Lord, and all the

doctrines of grace;' and his pastor asks, 'who has forgotten the noble stand he took, almost unaided, against the attempt to violate the sanctity of the Sabbath, by opening the public library on the Lord's Day' ... Mr. Jewett was elected a member of this Society in 1855" (New England Hist. and Gen. Register. Vol. XXII).

Another writer says: "The Poet Cicero beautifully calls the library, the soul of the house. Professor Jewett, with a noble ambition, has jealously striven to provide such a soul for this great Republic by his intelligent labors in connection with the Smithsonian Institute at Washington."

1816-68, American librarian, b. Lebanon, Maine. Jewett prepared his first catalog of books as librarian of Andover Theological Seminary. He was appointed librarian of Brown Univ. in 1841, where he rearranged and cataloged that library by subjects. In 1848 he became librarian of the Smithsonian Institution. There he published a survey of U.S. libraries and started mechanical duplication of individual catalog entries. As superintendent of the Boston Public Library from 1858 to 1865, Jewett worked out catalog rules which were adopted internationally The Columbia Encyclopedia, Sixth Edition. 2001

Jewett, Charles Coffin, Bibliographers, was born in Lebanon, Me., Aug 12, 1816. Of his early education little is known. He was a graduate of Brown University in 1835, after which he devoted two years to teaching. He next studied theology at Andover, being at the same time the librarian of the seminary, and preparing a carefully compiled catalogue of the books. He paid special attention to the oriental languages and antiquities with a view to becoming a missionary in the orient; was graduated from Andover 1840; took charge of an academy in Wrentham, Mas., for a short time; became librarian of Brown university in 1841, and rearranged the library on an original idea, cataloguing it in such a systematic and convenient method that it met with favor in many other libraries, and attracted wide attention in Europe. He was appointed professor of modern languages in the university in 1843; made a visit to England and the continent to study the library systems in vogue in those countries; purchased many books in both Greek and Latin literature, and classical works of many modern authors. On his return he devoted himself to Brown University until 1848, when he himself became librarian and assistant secretary to the then newly organized Smithsonian Institute at Washington. He remained ten years at the Smithsonian, during which time he prepared and extended report regarding the public libraries in the United States, that was in 1850 duly issued by the institute among its publications. He also perfected a system of cataloguing by separately stereotyping the title of each work in the library. In 1858 the building of the famous Boston library was completed, and Mr. Jewett was elected its first superintendent. He immediately resigned his position in the Smithsonian, and entering upon the duties of his new position, remained at his post of duty until his death ten years later. The work he did in the preparation of catalogues, and the rules laid down, served as models of library economy throughout the United States as well as Canada. Obituary:

Charles graduated from the New Hampton School in New Hampton, New Hampshire in 1938 and Brown University in 1942. From 1942-1946 he served the country in World War II, with the United States Marine Corp in the South Pacific. Charles was one of the officers in charge of the 51st Defense Battalion, which was the first all-African -American battalion. He was very proud of his years in the Marine Corps. After serving in World War II, Charles studied Law at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. It was here he earned his Law degree and met the love of his life, Evangeline Wiseman. They were married for almost 70 years, until she passed in 2010. Charles and Evangeline's love, devotion, and dedication to each other were traits that everyone who knew them celebrated and admired. Charles and Evangeline settled in Amherst, NH where he became the town judge and practiced law. He also served as judge in the District Court in Manchester, NH. With a keen sense of humor, Charles wrote the book *New England Town Affairs: The Puckerbrush Papers*, which chronicled true cases from Amherst and Milford, NH; the names changed to protect the "not-so innocent." While living in Amherst, Charles' hobbies included building an asphalt plant with his friend David Ramsay, manufacturing British fisherman smocks, collecting fire engines in his barn, starting a diamond needle company, and operating a fleet of commercial lobster boats. He was often found in Rye Harbor, NH on one of his boats fishing with his daughter, or cruising about the New Hampshire coast.

Charles is survived by his daughter Evangeline Anne Lincoln Wollmar and her husband Douglas with whom he lived with for the last nine years of his life; his three grandchildren, Aaron Lincoln Friedman, Skylar Allyn Lincoln and Charles Jefferson Friedman; also his son Colin Lincoln and his wife Leona Clough, grandson and his wife, Jason and Estelle Lincoln, and a Great Grandson Dylan Lincoln. He also leaves behind his dear friend and former law partner, William Edwards who remains a loyal and very special friend to Charles and his family.

I like to tell the story of DAR in two ways. You can choose which you prefer.

The first is: Being excluded from membership in SAR, the outraged ladies vowed to organize their own society. They promised each other to make it larger and more involved in the community than the gentlemen. Included in that resolve; purchase and build their own headquarters in Washington, DC. Today, the three buildings comprise one city block near the White House at 1776 D Street Northwest. These buildings house the administration center, a wonderful museum including a collection of original documents from the 1700's and the 1800's. The research library is second only to the genealogical library in Salt Lake City. The hall for special events and DAR's annual meeting is acoustically perfect. Did you know that Washington National Opera under the direction of Placido Domingo performed their operas at Constitution Hall while their own facility was under construction?

And now the true story: Sons of the American Revolution was organized in 1875 in California. Numerous State SAR Societies were organized after that date, some including women. However, the Lexington, Kentucky Society members voted to exclude women at a meeting in 1890. It turned out to be a fateful decision. The news media (nothing like a love hate relationship there) seized on the story and it became the topic of the day. Mary Lockwood, reading the article fired off a response to the paper reminding Americans that women participated in the revolutionary war. That riled other ladies to action. We all know what happens when ladies are upset.

In July 1890, Senator John Sherman expressed his regret concerning the exclusion of women from the organization. SAR President General, William O. McDowell suggested women should form their own organization in his own letter to the Washington Post inviting eligible ladies to submit their names to him for purposes of organizing DAR. Miss Eugenia Washington, Miss Mary Desha, Mrs. Hannah McLaren Wolff, Mrs. Louise Brown and Mrs. Mary Hallowell, all of Washington, DC and Mrs. Roger Pryor of New York responded. Mrs. Ellen Hardin Walworth joined the ladies at the first meeting in Washington. Organization moved forward, including the decision to ask Mrs. Caroline Scott Harrison, wife of President Benjamin Harrison to serve as President of the fledgling organization. Mary Desha would serve as Chairman, since the office of president was more a symbolic one. Mrs. Harrison's duties as First Lady were her first priority. Mrs. Walworth was asked to be secretary and Mrs. Washington, Registrar. Mr. McDowell did submit an application for membership, but it was rejected. **THIS WAS AN ORGANIZATION FOR THE LADIES, AFTER ALL.**

October 11, 1890 was designated as general meeting and organization day for Daughters of the American Revolution. Eighteen ladies attended the organizational meeting. Caroline Harrison was elected President General at the general meeting following the organizational meeting. Other offices filled included seven (7) vice president's general (that needs explaining and will be done further down), secretary general, treasurer general, registrar general, historian general, surgeon general, chaplain general. It is interesting to note that

Clara Barton was named surgeon general. A constitution was adopted propelling the organization to the greatness it enjoys today.

The founding ladies knew DAR needed a “home” to store records, house a library and have a “state of the art” facility for meetings. Donations rolled in and by 1897 a special committee asked congress for ground to build memorial Continental Hall. Through an error, the property originally “earmarked” was not available. The ladies raised additional funds to purchase the property at 1776 D Street.

The DAR motto is God, Home and Country. Our mission is education, historic preservation and service to our veterans and active military. A lot when you think about it, especially with 41 committees not including the new one, ‘Celebrate America’. With all that involvement, we need the 175,000 members in all 50 states and 13 foreign countries. These wonderful ladies really support the nineteen scholarships offered at the national level and the DAR Good Citizens scholarship. I am particularly excited about the Special Projects Grants program begun three years ago and the new Celebrate America project. This committee will honor 125 years of DAR in 2015 by asking all members to participate individually, in community service projects. The National Society has provided suggestions, but encourages state societies and chapters to create their own ideas. Suggestions???? I will do the project for two chapters and will be happy to use your thoughts. And now to the Vice Presidents’ General. There are 21, 7 elected every year for a three year term. NOT to be confused with the First Vice President General, these ladies are not members of the national executive board. These ladies are members of the national board of management as are The State Regents.

If it sounds like I know a bit about this organization, believe me I am just a beginner. I have been a member 26 years and find I am still learning new things every day. Since I know so very little about the organization, I did reference ‘A century of service, the story of DAR’. The history was written at the behest of the late Honorary President General, Marie Yokum. The author was Ann Arnold Hunter.
